Overview

What is the PE and sport funding?

The government provided additional funding of £150 million each year for 2013 to improve provision of physical education and sport in primary schools. This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in school. Each school received £8000, plus £5 per pupil on roll in January 2017. How will we invest this at Parkland Primary School?

At Parkland we have developed a provision plan to ensure this funding is invested to maximise the long term impact of our PE provision for pupils and staff. The funding is invested in various ways and the impact of these initiatives is being closely monitored through assessment of children’s skills, staff and pupil feedback, uptake of clubs etc. At Parkland, we pride ourselves on being a happy and healthy place to learn.

Expenditure and Impact

School has links with many external agencies and they provide additional support in these areas. We have a lot of children who are subject to Child in Need plans or have social workers and our Parental Involvement Worker has made links with groups through work with social services.

External agencies provide additional sessions for children which provide:

- support on appropriate play outside school
- involvement in dance and movement events and training
- healthy lifestyles support
- cooking sessions
- links with local football teams and scouting

We have also received some Opportunity Area funding for summer term 2018 and the academic year 2018-2019. Additional holiday clubs have been planned and we are running additional clubs each week focusing on dance and movement as children in school express a particular interest in this area.
